



Here we are once again out with our latest newsletter that summarizes how things are going here with the children and in Nepal. After months of lockdown last year, things seemed to be normal for a few months. However, now we are once more in a very strict lockdown where people aren't allowed to leave their home unless for emergency. Each day the cases are rising and so is the number of deaths. Yesterday (may 7) there were 23 new infections 3 deaths only in Pokhara.



Just like in India the cases and deaths are rising rapidly. Hospitals do not have beds for new patients and people are dying due to a shortage of oxygen. Major global media around the world have raised concerns about Nepal at this point. The children's progress has been affected dramatically since the start of the pandemic. They hardly had classes in their schools and they had to adjust to the new norms of education ie online classes. But children here at home are dedicated and luckily we have a few desktops that were bought last year which have been a large help for them to attend their classes. From kindergarten to high school every class is now online.

There are hardly any tourists in Pokhara and likewise it's been more than a year since any of our sponsors or volunteers have visited us. Its difficult for us to maintain patience and hope vaccines will help deal with the abnormal situation. All of our outdoor programs and events are canceled for the time being. Once again half of the children are moved to our farm which is isolated and provides less chance of the virus effecting our children.

It's been a very hard month for me personally. Around April 14 I began to feel dizzy and my metabolism wasn't working so well. When I visited the doctor, they found that my high blood pressure was out of control, the readings reached 180-120. I thought my medicines were working and waited to go to the hospital. The next three days were even more difficult. The pressure kept rising and my body was swollen. Doctors just kept adding more medicines and on the fourth day, I was vomiting constantly from the early morning. I was immediately rushed to Kathmandu by air and admitted to the hospital. Within a few hours, the vomiting stopped and they were able to lower my blood pressure. After a night there, I stayed few more days to do further examinations. They revealed I needed to be more physically active and lose weight. They increased the doses of the medicine and have said it will take months before the pressure comes back to normal. Until then, I have to be careful, keep taking readings occasionally and if I feel dizziness I have to take emergency medication, but most importantly I have to start losing weight. My last readings were 169/100, just before I took my medicine this morning. These days since we can't go out of the home, I work with the children in the vegetable garden so I m spending more time with the children that are here. I hope things will eventually be better.

8. New Children





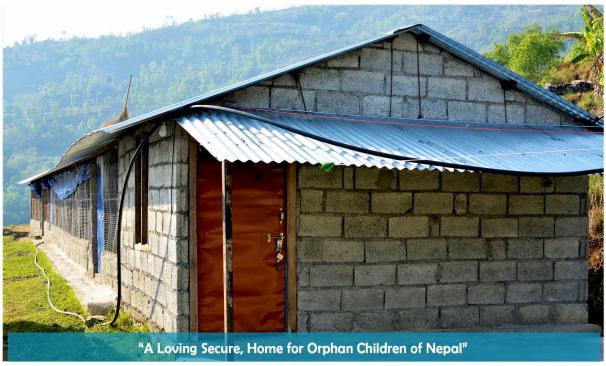
